



The Holy Year - JUBILEE 2025



JUBILEE 2025

The theme of the 2025 Jubilee is captured in its motto: Pilgrims in Hope and the title of the papal decree proclaiming the Holy Year: Spes non Confundit (Hope does not Disappoint) (Rom. 5:5) The Jubilee aims to inspire a collective sense of hope, particularly in light of recent global challenges like the COVID-19 pandemic, social disparities, and environmental issues. It summons us to be renewed in hope, and in turn, to be tangible signs of hope for those who experience hardship of any kind.

JUBILEE PRAYER

Father in heaven, may the faith you have given us in your son, Jesus Christ, our brother, and the flame of charity enkindled in our hearts by the Holy Spirit, reawaken in us the blessed hope for the coming of your Kingdom. May your grace transform us into tireless cultivators of the seeds of the Gospel. May those seeds transform from within both humanity and the whole cosmos in the sure expectation of a new heaven and a new earth, when, with the powers of Evil vanquished, your glory will shine eternally. May the grace of the Jubilee reawaken in us, Pilgrims of Hope a yearning for the treasures of heaven. May that same grace spread the joy and peace of our Redeemer throughout the earth, to you our God, eternally blessed, be glory and praise for ever. Amen.

WHAT IS A JUBILEE YEAR?

A Holy Year or Jubilee is a time of special graces, pilgrimage, prayer, repentance and acts of mercy, based on the Old Testament tradition of a jubilee of rest, forgiveness, and renewal. (Lev. 25: 10-15) It is also a time to visit designated churches and shrines, recite special prayers, go to confession, and receive Communion to receive a plenary indulgence. The aim of a Holy Year is holiness of life. It is convoked

to strengthen faith, encourage works of charity and foster a consistent living of the faith. Pope Boniface VIII proclaimed the first Christian Jubilee in 1300. Since then, proclaimed the first Christian Jubilee in 1300. Since then, there have been twenty-six "ordinary" Holy Years, observed nearly every twenty-five or fifty years, the last being in 2000, proclaimed by St. John Paul II. Since the 16th century, a number of "extraordinary" Jubilees were proclaimed to commemorate the anniversaries of significant events. In the Diocese of Trenton the Holy Year begins December 24, 2024 and will conclude January 6, 2026.

ELEMENTS OF A HOLY YEAR

Pilgrimage is an image of discipleship. We often speak of our earthly life as a pilgrimage. Jesus said, "I am the way and the truth and the life" (Jn 14:6), so Christians are always called to be with Jesus "on the way," journeying toward the Kingdom. More literally, a pilgrimage is an actual journey to visit holy places—not as a tourist, but as one seeking to grow in faith and become a better Christian.

There are many instances of pilgrimage in Sacred Scripture: the journeys of Abraham and Moses, the pilgrimages to the Temple of Jerusalem, the shepherds' going in haste to the newborn Jesus, the journey of the Magi to worship the child Jesus, and the journey of the women to the Lord's empty tomb on Easter. In the first centuries of the Church, Christians began to journey to places made sacred by Christ's life. A true pilgrimage should integrate education, spirituality, and community (although one can be a solitary pilgrim) to keep it from becoming a sightseeing venture.

The **Holy Door** at the Basilicas in Rome is a crucial symbol of the Jubilee Year. Jesus said: "I am the door. If anyone enters by me, he will be saved." (Jn 10:9) Crossing the threshold of the Holy Door into the church is symbolic of passing from this world into the presence of God, passing from sin to grace, and from separation to union with God. Since many of us are unable to travel to Rome, Bishop O'Connell has designated a church in each county as a Pilgrimage destination. In order to experience and obtain the plenary Indulgence, the faithful are called to make a pilgrimage to one of these churches.

Plenary Indulgences available during this Jubilee Year of 2025



There are special Plenary Indulgences available during this Jubilee Year of 2025 that every Catholic family can participate in! The Vatican's Office of the Apostolic Penitentiary released explains that during the Jubilee Year, the faithful can obtain up to two plenary indulgences per day for the poor souls in Purgatory.

Now, in order to obtain any plenary indulgence this year, here are the three conditions that must be fulfilled:

- 1. You must receive the Sacrament of Confession 20 days before or after the indulgence is to be gained and be detached from all sin (including venial).
- 2. You must receive Holy Communion on the day that you perform the indulgence.
- 3. You must pray for the intentions of the Holy Father (the prayers you choose to pray are up to you, but an "Our Father" and a "Hail, Mary" are suggested).

Reflect on the unique gifts and qualities God has given you. Do you truly embrace them, or do you sometimes feel pressured to fit into the expectations of others?


Are you living as an "original," fully yourself in God's plan, or have you found yourself conforming to what the world tells you to be?

Gospel Reading ~ Luke 6:17,20-26 Jesus teaches the crowd the way to happiness.

Today's Gospel offers a contrast to many of the messages we hear in our society today. If we were to accept uncritically the "get ahead" messages of our culture, we would think that happiness means having money, being successful, and having many possessions. In this way, we are not unlike the people who heard Jesus teach on the day that he taught the Beatitudes. They too associated happiness with possessions and success. The report of the Beatitudes in Luke's Gospel, however, takes things one step further. Not only will we not find happiness through the "get ahead" messages of the world, but relying upon these messages will cause us harm. The warnings spoken are particularly challenging because they suggest that our way of life must change if we are to gain the lasting happiness of eternal life.

Talk together as a family about what society tells us makes a person successful. Make a list of the traits that you associate with a successful person. Then read together today's Gospel, Luke 6:17,20-26. Reflect on Jesus' description of blessedness in the Kingdom of God. Then consider the warnings. Why are these surprising and challenging? What, then, is the measure of success in the Kingdom of God? Together write prayers of petition based on your discussion. Pray these prayers together, asking God to help your family seek the blessings of the Kingdom of God.

Heavenly Father,

You have taught us through Your Son that true happiness is not found in wealth or power, but in trusting You and living with love and humility. Grant us the grace to seek the treasures of Your Kingdom, hungering for righteousness and peace, rather than the fleeting rewards of this world.

Strengthen our hearts to embrace the Beatitudes, to be merciful, meek, and faithful in suffering for Your name.

Help us measure success by love and service, that we may one day share in Your eternal joy. Through Christ our Lord. Amen. The month of February is dedicated to the Holy Family

And going out about the third hour, he saw others standing in the market place idle, and he said to them: Go you also into my vineyard, and I will give you what shall be just. And they went their way. And again he went out about the sixth and ninth hour: and did in like manner. But about the eleventh hour he went out and found others standing, and he saith to them: Why stand you here all the day idle? They say to him: Because no man hath hired us. He saith to them: Go you also into my vineyard. And when evening was come, the lord of the vineyard saith to his steward: Call the laborers and pay them their hire, beginning from the last even to the first. When therefore they were come, that came about the eleventh hour, they received every man a penny. But when the first also came, they thought that they should receive more: and they also received every man a penny. And receiving it they murmured against the master of the house, saying: These last have worked but one hour, and thou hast made them equal to us, that have borne the burden of the day and the heats. But he answering said to one of them: Friend, I do thee no wrong: didst thou not agree with me for a penny? Take what is thine and go thy way: I will also give to this last even as to thee. Or, is it not lawful for me to do what I will? Is thine eye evil, because I am good? So shall the last be first, and the first last. For many are called, but few chosen. -Credo.

Septuagesima Sunday: A Call to Prepare for Lent

This Sunday marks **Septuagesima**, the beginning of the Church's **pre-Lenten season** in the Traditional Latin Mass. As we transition from the joys of Christmas to the penitential spirit of Lent, the **Alleluia is omitted**, and the liturgical color shifts to **violet**, reminding us to turn our hearts toward God in **prayer and penance**.

The Gospel (Matthew 20:1-16) calls us to reflect on God's **justice and mercy**, inviting us to labor for His Kingdom. Let us use this time to **prepare our souls** for the holy season of Lent through renewed devotion and sacrifice.

St. Paul tells us that this world is a race, wherein all must run; but that they alone win the prize, who run well. Let us, therefore, rid ourselves of everything that could impede us, and make us lose our crown. Let us not deceive ourselves: we are never sure, until we reach the goal. Is our conversion more solid than was St. Paul's? Are our good works better done, or more meritorious, than were his? Yet he assures us that he was not without the fear that he might perhaps be lost; for which cause he chastised his body, and kept it in subjection to the spirit.

Man, in his present state, has not the same will for all that is right and just, which Adam had before he sinned, and which, notwithstanding, Adam abused to his own ruin. We have a bias which inclines us to evil; so that our only means of keeping our ground is to sacrifice the flesh to the spirit. To many this is very harsh doctrine; hence, they are sure to fail; they never can win the prize. Like the Israelites spoken of by our apostle, they will be left behind to die in the desert, and so lose the promised land. Yet they saw the same miracles that Josue and Caleb saw!

So true is it that nothing can make a salutary impression on a heart which is obstinately bent on fixing all its happiness in the things of this present life; and though it is forced, each day, to own that they are vain, yet each day it returns to them, vainly but determinedly loving them.




